# **Communication Aids - Funding**

A good place to start when considering your funding options is your local Assessment Service.

Funding for AAC assessments and equipment has changed significantly in England following NHS England recognising a duty to provide assessments and equipment for those individuals with the most complex communication needs (estimated to be 10% of the AAC population). For more information please see read the Complex Disability Equipment - Communication Aids (Specialised AAC services) Service Specification D01/S/b. A ring-fenced annual budget of £15 million for the provision of specialised AAC services by the 14 NHS Commissioned AAC Hubs has been agreed until 31/03/17. It has also been stated that local statutory services should continue to fund adequate local provision to meet the needs of those individuals with less complex needs (estimated to be 90% of the AAC population).
